THE GIFT OF THEIR VOICE

Supporting a loved one as they recover and heal in the intensive care unit (ICU) is incredibly emotional for family members and friends. One of the biggest challenges for both the patient and their loved ones is communication.

When a patient must have their breathing supported with a machine such as CPAP or BiPAP, either as a step down from just coming off a ventilator where a tube was just taken out of the airway, or at times to prevent the need for that tube to be placed in the airway and then being placed on a ventilator, it makes speaking next to impossible. This is heartbreaking for all involved. Loss of communication coupled with a fear of mortality, a stressful environment, and various medical conditions can cause a patient who would otherwise recover quickly, to withdraw into a resignation that hampers recovery and reduces efficacy of treatment.

Being able to talk with doctors, nurses, therapists and family is crucial in the guidance of the appropriate patient care plan.

After many years working in the ICU at Kelowna General Hospital, and bearing witness to the physical, emotional and medical (patients also have a hard time communicating their needs to their medical team) impact of being on a CPAP of BiPAP machine continuously, Dr. Douglass Rolf learned of a medical device that promised to help.


The Dolores One is a first-of-its-kind speech enhancement device specifically designed for critical care patients. The technology was developed to ensure that ICU patients need not be isolated during their respiratory treatment. The small device is comprised of an acoustic throat sensor that is attached to the patient's neck,


picking up vocal cord vibrations and transmitting the signal to the control unit that processes the sensor signal and then outputs the patient's voice. The device's advanced technology is capable of automatically accommodating both weak forced voices, even whispers, and produces an output to allow for normal conversation in the patient's natural voice, free from the sounds of rushing air or equipment noises.

From a patient perspective, the Delores One allows for uninterrupted treatment, an integral part of the care environment. Patients can speak with their loved ones, communicate their needs to the care team and feel a part of the process with their doctors. Direct physician-patient communication is integral in medical practice. This two-way exchange of information allows the physician to gauge the mental condition of the patient, and to receive first-hand feedback regarding treatment. Patients are able to respond to friends and family's encouragement and support, or share in their final moments of life.

The myriad of benefits inspired Dr. Rolf, who chose to personally fund the purchase of two Dolores One devices. 'I was thrilled to discover that this technology existed and knew that it would have a huge impact on the emotional well-being of our patients,' says Dr. Rolf.

And for those who love these patients most, the gift is priceless.





AN IMMEDIATE NEED

DONORS DELIVER KNOCK-OUT FOR LIFE-SAVING DIAGNOSTICS

In 2017, the Gastroenterology (GI) lab at Kelowna General Hospital was at peak capacity. Running the existing four general endoscopy suites every day added up to the tune of 10,000 colonoscopy and gastroscopy procedures every year. Even still, serving a rapidly growing and aging population in the southern interior of BC, meant that every year, the list of patients requiring these often lifesaving procedures was far exceeding the GI department's capacity to schedule them in a timely manner.

Patients awaiting endoscopy exams are either struggling with symptoms or have been told by their doctor that further diagnostics are required to determine whether changes in their colon may or may not be serious. The chief concern is the detection of pre-cancerous or cancerous changes in the colon of the gastrointestinal tract. Early detection is known to be beneficial in any treatment plan, so there is understandable urgency in scheduling the procedures.

In August 2017, the waitlist for endoscopic procedures reached its peak of 5,439 patients. Their expected wait time - approximately 28 weeks.

Collectively, the KGH GI physicians took action, proposing that a fifth room would significantly reduce wait times and thereby the emotional distress caused to patients required to wait for their procedures.

In order to implement fully, the project would require enough funding to not only cover the investment in the endoscopic equipment required to outfit the space, but also funding to

operationalize the suite. Endoscopy physicians, including gastroenterologists and general surgeons, with the support of specialty nurses, would be needed to perform these sensitive diagnostic tests.

If implemented, the new GI procedure room would allow the GI team to perform an additional 2,400 procedures per year.

Working together with Interior Health, KGH Foundation donors saw their opportunity to take on the GI waitlist with authority, and were quick to fulfill the \$175,000 funding gap to ensure the project's completion.

This urgently needed room and equipment was supported by Dean and Mary Miller, Roger and Donna Brett, along with legacy endowment gifts provided by the Mazzoli Memorial Endowment, The Ogden Endowment and the George and Dora Rozier Memorial Endowment.

The new GI room opened in September 2017.

"Thanks to the generosity of the community, patient waitlists have dropped dramatically from over 5,000 to 1,500 which is remarkable" says Dr. Kaylee Milne, one of KGH's specialized gastroenterologists. "These diagnostic procedures absolutely save lives. By working together with the community, we have been able to relieve a huge strain on our system. The entire KGH GI team and our patients are incredibly grateful."

KIWANIS LEGACY FUND

GIFTING LEADING EDGE CONCUSSION SUPPORT FOR LOCAL YOUTH

In October 2017, Kelowna General Hospital received the largest gift in its 109 year history serving this community: a \$4 million endowment from the Kiwanis Clubs of Kelowna. The proceeds from the KGH Foundation Kiwanis Legacy Fund would be specifically dedicated to supporting local programs for children and youth in healthcare.

This past spring, the first community grant from the fund was awarded to BrainTrust Canada - a \$20,000 grant to support BrainTrust's "Concussion Recovery for BC Children and Youth" initiative.

The project will facilitate immediate access to medically supervised, acute concussion care for up to fifty local children and youth who might not otherwise be able to benefit from this service due to financial barriers.

Concussion is a serious brain injury that requires specific treatment for full recovery. Over the past two decades, more has been learned about the devastating effects of under-treated concussions in children and youth. Proper concussion care is the best way to mitigate the likelihood of long-term consequences. One of the chief considerations concerning youth is the appropriate timeline to return to activity. Until they are fully healed, children should be closely monitored and their activities managed carefully. Medical clearance on the return to normal activities is essential.

The BrainTrust concussion clinic is unique. It's the only medically supervised program in Canada that also incorporates individual case management, helping children and youth from the day of injury up to 30 days after their concussion. Unfortunately, their program is not currently covered under MSP.

The Kiwanis Legacy Fund grant will allow BrainTrust's brain injury specialists to provide immediate, critical concussion care to youth and families who cannot financially afford the services. "With the funds provided by the Kiwanis Legacy Fund grant, BrainTrust will be able to break down financial barriers keeping some children from receiving the care they need to recover from their injuries." says Mona Hennenfent, CEO of BrainTrust Canada. "The impact of this gift is incredibly significant."

BrainTrust also proposes that results from the research gathered from this initiative will provide important validation to their youth concussion recovery model. With this validation in hand, BrainTrust aims to continue to advocate for increases to youth concussion care funding through MSP.

In the central Okanagan, there are approximately 41,000 children and youth age 5 to 25: 66% of males and 52% of females play organized sports. Evidence suggests that approximately 1 in 6 will sustain a concussion during their sporting season.

FROM THE TINY SEED

Looking back at the photos of those who were the pioneers of health care in the early days of our community, it's hard not to reflect on the impact their gifts of time, talent or treasure as the decades have passed.

In May, the KGH Foundation hosted our second annual Legacy Donor Appreciation Event – an opportunity to acknowledge and express gratitude to those who have chosen to leave a gift in their will to the hospital.

Sharron Simpson, community historian and local author of Kelowna General Hospital – The First 100 years 1908-2008, spoke at the event. She shared heart-warming stories of the early, local heroes of healthcare, icons of innovation and pioneers of philanthropy - those who have left tremendous legacies not only through their financial giving, but through gifts of time and passion. These individuals have helped shape our community. The impact of their gifts grows as each year passes.

Whether it be by design or happenstance, a legacy gift is a like the tiny seed that holds with it the promise of a thousand forests.

From a few tiny seeds of possibility planted with kindness, creativity and passion, a robust and thriving centre of health care excellence has risen. Today, Kelowna General Hospital serves up to 1 million residents in the interior of British Columbia. But back then, in 1908, it was just a small, 19 bed community hospital.

However, as Sharron astutely observed (with a little chuckle), "if you were to ask any of them if what they were doing was creating a legacy, they would all likely scoff and laugh at such ridiculousness'. Those who work with legacy donors would agree – their generosity is only exceeded by their humility.

One of these founding pioneers was Christina Leathley. Beloved by all who had the privilege to know her, she was known simply as 'Chrissie'. She stood out among the many volunteers who have given their time to serve patients and families at Kelowna General Hospital over the years.

Chrissie began her nurse's training at the Kelowna Hospital School of Nursing in 1935 and she remained involved with the hospital for over 75 years – a truly remarkable gift to any organization. Chrissie gave because she felt called to do so - out of enthusiasm, affection and gratitude. 'Leaving a legacy' wasn't her goal; only to serve in the greatest capacity she had. Her contributions spanned generations.





BETTER TOGETHER

Today, advancements in technology and treatments are opening doors to new services and medical innovation, and with them, countless opportunities to enhance patient care. More than ever, philanthropy is making a remarkable difference, now, and for generations to come. A vibrant, healthy relationship between hospital foundations and the health authority responsible for the delivery of care in the region is vital.

In their own words, Interior Health CEO, Susan Brown, and KGH Foundation CEO, Doug Rankmore, share a few highlights from the past year, and provide a little insight as to why they love the work they do.



- **DR:** Over the past few years, the relationship between the KGH Foundation and Interior Health has really transformed, mostly because of our mutually shared commitment to really working together. We share a common vision the delivery of world-class health care in our region. Thanks to the generosity of donors, and a strong, dynamic partnership with Interior Health, Kelowna General Hospital (KGH) is becoming a high-performing, centre of excellence in health care. Obviously, this is of great benefit to the people who live in this area but it is also incredibly important to our larger health system, that we have a thriving, tertiary hospital here in Kelowna.
- **SB:** I couldn't agree more. IH has a closely-linked network of 22 hospitals, as well as dozens more public health, community and long-term care sites, serving the many rural and urban communities in our region. Our larger hospitals, like KGH, work closely with acute sites across the health authority. Sometimes this means that patients with more complex needs come to Kelowna for the specialty care that is available here, and our teams work together to support their transition back home when they're ready. In other cases, our specialists and staff at KGH connect with their colleagues across IH virtually increasing the reach of the hospital beyond our immediate community. Working in partnership should absolutely be the new normal in health care.
- **DR:** As the CEO of the KGH Foundation, I look for opportunities to create impact for patients that would otherwise not be possible through government funding alone, and in ways that improve the overall patient experience of care. The partnership with Interior Health has really opened up over the last several years, largely through open, honest dialogue that ultimately results in the community being able to step-up and help where it is needed most.
- **SB:** We are always looking to improve equipment and services, medical education, and programs within our hospital to meet the needs of our patients. We do rely on our strong partnerships with the KGH Foundation, and the other foundations across IH to make this happen, with campaigns that fund technologies and state-of-the-art equipment, taking patient care to the next level. Our health system today is much more integrated than in the past, and in fact involves a wide variety of partners. There are a few key reasons for this advances in technology allow us to easily connect and work more effectively together; patients are asking for better coordination for a better experience; and there are limited resources within the system, so collaboration is a must.

- **DR:** One of the best examples of our work together in Kelowna is JoeAnna's House, the 20-bed, short-term home currently under construction on the KGH campus a much-needed support for patients and their loved ones. This "home away from home" will keep families together, assist in patient recovery and reduce the stresses that critical illness can bring for those who must travel for a higher level of care.
- **SB:** We are really excited about JoeAnna's House, and are looking forward to being there when the doors open later this year. When the idea of JoeAnna's House was first discussed a few years ago, Interior Health quickly understood the remaining challenge: location. We knew the best solution was to have JoeAnna's House located on-site, so we moved swiftly. Gifting the location at the corner of Royal Ave. and Abbott St. gives us great pride. JoeAnna's House will be invaluable to patients and families from out of town it will make such a difference. It is a testament to this community that so many businesses and people locally are also contributing to its success. This is such a great example of the value of partnership.
- **DR:** Our donors are always curious about opportunities to bring new services or support new technologies that will make a radical difference for patients. Two years ago, Interior Health approached the KGH Foundation to assist with a strategy addressing a need in cardiology. Echocardiograms are a test used to diagnose heart disorders, and at the time Interior Health was looking at options to increase access to the service. Working together, IH and our Foundation identified a solution that is quite literally saving lives today. The Foundation purchased two new cardiovascular ultrasound machines, and IH arranged for one to be placed in the hospital and one to be located in the community. Community support made it possible for the KGH Foundation to immediately fund the machines, and in turn, the cardiology team was able to reduce the wait list to zero in three months!
- **SB:** What I appreciate about that example is that we worked together and identified an innovative opportunity that includes care outside the walls of the hospital. As we move forward, we need to apply new ways of thinking to how we address the needs of our patients, families and the broader community. The KGH Foundation is a key partner in this journey thank you!
- **DR:** It is with great pride that we can demonstrate that our partnership is the best it's ever been.


