VINNI MOVES ONE STEP CLOSER TO HOME

It's official. Vinni has captured imaginations, inspired kids to write heartfelt cards, and become the name on countless donation envelopes. The community has fallen in love with KGH's new superstar robot—Vinni. While the character is cute, the actual robotic assisted surgical system will be a game changer for our surgeons, enhancing their skills to a superhuman level they couldn't achieve otherwise.

This year's record breaking Day of Giving only proved how invested our community is in bringing Vinni home. Thanks to many, many generous individuals, families, and organizations, a record breaking \$1,236,527 was raised to help transform surgical care at KGH.

The funds will support the acquisition of Vinni who, once implemented, will be the first system of its kind in the Interior Health region and a pivotal step toward establishing KGH as a Centre of Surgical Excellence in BC.

Among the most powerful moments on Day of Giving was a surprise phone call from Cliff and Lois Serwa, who pledged an additional \$500,000 matching donation. Their gift was timely as we were about to exceed our original match of \$500,000 and kept the momentum going to inspire giving beyond the event.

Guided by their family's simple but powerful philosophy, "If you've got it, give it," the Serwas' generosity ensures that every new donation

will continue to be matched, dollar for dollar.

The Day of Giving has pushed the total surgical robotics campaign past \$4.06 million of its \$6 million goal. Now, the dream of bringing Vinni home is well on its way to becoming a reality.

Kelowna resident Michele Therriault experienced the life-changing benefits of robotic-assisted surgery firsthand when she had to travel to Vancouver to save her kidney.

"I feel incredibly lucky my surgeon could use robotics," Michele shares. "By the second day, I was up and moving, people couldn't believe I'd just had surgery. My incisions were about 1 inch each. By the second week I was able to do a lot and care for myself. People need to understand this technology made my major surgery feel much less than that. This is the future of health care, and it's going to change everything."

Michele's experience reflects a growing challenge. As the Southern Interior's primary referral hospital, KGH serves nearly one million people, yet many patients still must travel to other centres for advanced procedures, adding financial strain and emotional stress to an already difficult time.

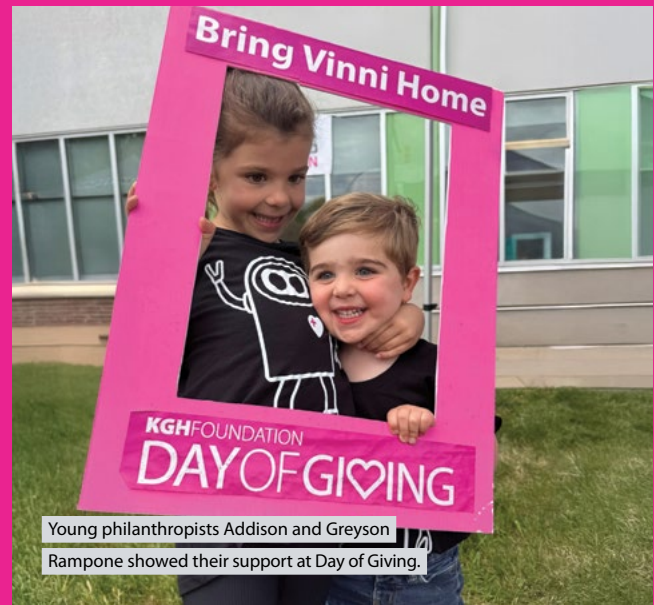
“

If this surgery had been available in Kelowna, I could've walked to the hospital, had my family by my side, and recovered sooner in my own bed," adds Michele. "I was blown away by how quickly I am healing. I truly hope we can bring this care to our community soon."

The surgical robotics campaign is part of the Foundation's broader Closer to Home Than You Think initiative, a bold \$40 million effort to transform health care at KGH and across the Southern Interior. With over \$30 million already raised, momentum is strong.

The overwhelming success of this year's Day of Giving is proof of what's possible when a community rallies behind a bold vision. With every gift, our region moves closer to a future where world-class surgical care is not the exception but the standard. To everyone who stepped up, thank you. Your generosity is not only transforming patient care at KGH—it's changing lives.

Together, we can bring Vinni home and ensure KGH remains at the forefront of surgical excellence.

DONOR DOLLARS POWER AI BREAKTHROUGH AT KGH

Artificial intelligence (AI) is transforming industries across the globe —and thanks to your generosity, it's now transforming lives at KGH

Artificial intelligence is changing the world, and now, thanks to your generosity, it's saving lives right here at home.

With donor support, the KGH Foundation funded a two-year pilot of RAPID AI, a cutting-edge brain imaging software revolutionizing stroke care across the Southern Interior. Launched in September 2023 by the Interior Health Stroke Network, RAPID AI analyzes CT scans in real time to identify the severity of a stroke and immediately alerts the neurologist at KGH via secure mobile app.

Thanks to your support, RAPID AI is now live at all nine CT-enabled hospitals across Interior Health. This marks the first model

of its kind in Canada to overcome rural and regional access challenges for timely stroke treatment. When it comes to stroke, faster diagnosis means a better chance at survival and recovery. Every moment matters.

The impact in just one year has been extraordinary:

- Median scan-to-review time: 7.22 minutes
- System live across all nine sites in IH
- Return on investment already nearing the original grant amount

Even during two 2024 Code Grey outages, when other systems went down, RAPID AI stayed fully functional thanks to its independent server, ensuring stroke care continued without delay.

RAPID AI has united specialists across neurology, emergency, radiology, digital health, and interventional care to create a faster, smarter response for stroke patients, no matter where they live.

Thanks to your support, this advanced technology is helping our care teams deliver faster diagnoses, better outcomes, and renewed hope to patients in every corner of our region.

INNOVATION IN NEONATAL CARE

TINY PATIENTS, BIG ADVANCES

How new technology is transforming care in the NICU for our most vulnerable newborns

Welcoming a baby into the world is one of life's greatest moments, but when complications arise, it can quickly become overwhelming. For families whose newborns require care in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), the journey can be both emotional and uncertain. Recent additions to NICU technology and care are helping to ease that stress, providing the best possible outcomes for our littlest patients.

For premature and critically ill newborns, every breath matters. But thanks to the generosity of Axiom Mortgage Solutions, our NICU's fleet is equipped with two more of the most advanced tools in neonatal respiratory care: the Servo-n ventilator.

This ventilator is gentle on small lungs and works in harmony with a baby's natural breathing. It works as a great partner to the clinicians, giving them the tools to respond quickly and accurately and most importantly, improves outcomes and gives that much needed peace of mind to families.

Thanks to The Sandra Schmirler Foundation, the NICU also now has a Giraffe Omnidex Carestation, a two-in-one neonatal device that combines the functionality of a radiant warmer with an incubator.

"The Giraffe helps regulate a baby's temperature and aims to create a peaceful and healing environment for both the baby and

the family by promoting stability and reducing stress," Danielle Bird, NICU Patient Care Coordinator shares. "This piece of equipment has been impactful for our NICU families. It's been amazing seeing the difference this device has made to provide developmentally supportive care."

Additional NICU equipment recently made possible by donors include comfort items for skin-to-skin contact, safe bathing experiences, and phototherapy.

Because of these latest advancements in the NICU, KGH teams can now provide even more specialized care for our littlest patients, helping them thrive during their earliest moments.

We met through Welcome Wagon, where Nancy was very well known for her volunteer work and deep commitment to the Lake Country community. Her compassion and generosity were inspiring, so it came as no surprise to learn she had thoughtfully included charitable gifts in her Will.

It wasn’t easy to lose her after celebrating her 70th birthday. Before she passed, Nancy appointed me as her Executor. Knowing I would carry out her final wishes brought me a sense of purpose and comfort. Being an Executor is a serious responsibility, but it’s also filled with meaning and reward. It took me four months to settle Nancy’s estate,

during which I found healing and learned even more about my dear friend.

Nancy often spoke about how grateful she was for the care she received at KGH for her pacemaker. In her will, she left generous gifts to both the KGH Foundation and the Red Deer Heart Foundation to support future cardiac patients.

Nancy’s careful planning ensured her peace of mind, and carrying out her legacy gave me mine. Through her charitable gifts her story will continue to touch countless lives, bringing healing and hope to those who need it most.

I was truly blessed to have a friend like Nancy. Her legacy now lives on not just in the hearts of those who knew her, but also in the lives of the many patients who will benefit from her extraordinary generosity.

OPENING MORE DOORS:

A REGION UNITED FOR JOEANNA'S HOUSE

Every day, families from across the Southern Interior arrive in Kelowna under the most stressful of circumstances, seeking urgent medical care for a loved one. For them, JoeAnna's House is more than just a place to stay; it's a sanctuary of comfort, connection, and care; a door held open when they need it most. As the walls of JoeAnna's House begin to expand, so too does the spirit of community that surrounds it.

Since first opening its doors in 2019, JoeAnna's House has provided over 27,000 nights of care to more than 1,000 families. Owned and operated by the KGH Foundation, the house was built thanks to the extraordinary legacy of Joe and Anna Huber, founders of Prestige Hotels & Resorts, and

the generous donors who believed in their vision. Built on philanthropy, and sustained entirely through community support, JoeAnna's House exists to keep families close during life's most challenging moments.

But demand has far exceeded capacity. With over 950 families turned away last year, the urgency to expand is clear. That's why the KGH Foundation has committed to adding 10 more rooms, a 50% increase, ensuring we never have to close the door on families in need.

The goal: to raise \$5.3 million to ensure more people can stay close to care, and close to family when it matters most.

Leading this effort is the JoeAnna's House Build Team: Chuck Cullen, Tim

Spiegel, and Terry Brown, along with KGH Foundation staff.

Now, the Community Cabinet has stepped in to volunteer their time and help with fundraising. This 14-member team of passionate, local leaders from across sectors; business, philanthropy, healthcare, and tourism, bring a unique perspective and a shared purpose to help more families in crisis find a place to rest, recover, and regroup.

"JoeAnna's House has always been the community's house, built and sustained by generosity," says Carly Malchuk, Director of Community Engagement. "This expansion is only possible because of community champions like our Cabinet members, who are using their voices and networks to open even more doors."

Together we grow... and open doors

For some, the project hits close to home.



To see JoeAnna's House grow is incredibly meaningful," says Chuck Cullen, a returning Cabinet member and the original build's Project Manager. "It's more than a build, it's community compassion in action."

While JoeAnna's House stands in Kelowna, its impact spans the entire region. Over 25% of patients at KGH come from outside the Central Okanagan. More than 80% of JoeAnna's House guests are from the BC Interior: Kootenays (41%), Thompson Cariboo Shuswap (22%), and the North and South Okanagan (20%). Families arrive for a wide range of urgent medical reasons including (but not limited to) cardiac events, stroke, pediatric care, cancer treatments, and trauma. JoeAnna's House becomes their home away from home.

Recognizing this shared need, four regional hospital foundations have also stepped forward in support: the East Kootenay Foundation for Health, Kootenay Boundary Regional Hospital Foundation, South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation, and the Vernon Jubilee Hospital Foundation. Together, they are helping to fundraise, increase awareness, and affirm that JoeAnna's House is a critical extension of care for families from every corner of the Interior.

This isn't just a Kelowna initiative, it's a regional collaboration, one rooted in unity, compassion, and a belief that health care doesn't stop at city limits. When families from across the Southern Interior stay at JoeAnna's House, it becomes their home too. This expansion is a shared investment in compassion, and regional health equity.

Thanks to the generosity of our donors, community and our regional foundation partners, we've taken the first bold steps toward expansion. But to reach our \$5.3 million goal, we will need to enlist all our neighbour's support.

PATIENT CARE AND COMFORT

THE HEALING POWER OF MUSIC

How Music Therapy at KGH is Transforming Patient Recovery and Mental Health

Most of us have experienced how a favourite song can brighten even the most difficult day. Now, through the addition of a music therapist in the KGH Acute Psychiatry program, the transformative power of music is impacting the lives of patients in a meaningful way.

Music therapy is a clinical discipline that uses music to support patients through their recovery. Delivered by Certified Music Therapists, it is an evidence-based practice that promotes emotional, physical, and mental health, contributing to holistic healing. It helps in improving the overall well-being of patients, reduces the length of stays, and encourages positive coping skills, stress relief, relaxation, and self-expression.

Since its inception in September of 2023, over 165 patients have participated in more than 230 music therapy sessions. And thanks to Music Heals Charitable Foundation and event proceeds from Rock the Foundation, this essential program has continued in 2025.

Working alongside, physicians, nurses, occupational therapists, and rehab assistants, music therapist Kayla Turnbull, provides a space for exploration and self-expression to patients in the McNair Inpatient psychiatric unit.

"I love seeing patients coming out of their shells and discovering there's so much more to them than their illness," Kayla says.

With continued support, Kayla is exploring new ways of integrating music therapy with

other education groups and health care disciplines including collaborations with Occupational Therapists, Psychologists, and Rehabilitation Assistants.

"Kayla's music program and her sincere wholehearted way of sharing the healing effects of music was a huge blessing and a vital part of my recovery," shares an anonymous patient from the McNair psychiatric unit, "I looked forward to every session and believe music therapy is and was vital to the progress I made. Music has the potential to change lives."

Music therapy has been a transformative step forward in patient centered care, offering a holistic and human approach to healing – one that resonates at the heart.

PLANTING THE SEEDS OF SYSTEM CHANGE

Thrive Okanagan facilitates multi-sector collaboration in support of mental health and community well-being in the Central Okanagan

In 2022, inspired by the community's desire to improve mental health care, the KGH Foundation launched the We See You campaign. The call to action focused on raising funds for two urgent mental health care priorities: addressing immediate program needs of local providers, and investing in long-term, system-level change. The campaign was an unprecedented success, and funds were immediately distributed to community service agencies including CMHA Kelowna, the Child and Youth Advocacy Centre, and more.

Donations also supported a review of the barriers to working as a mental health system of care. Guided by a review of the many strategies and plans from all levels of government, expert research, and input from over 30 social sector leaders, the findings identified key priorities—stronger coordination among service providers, deeper trust between sectors, and a strategic shift toward prevention of illness and crisis. It was from this shared vision that Thrive Okanagan was born.

Thrive Okanagan's driving mission is to support the system changes needed in local mental health care by facilitating collaboration and community-led solutions focused on prevention. To guide this work, the initiative developed a Mental Well-Being Goal Framework for the Central Okanagan, facilitated gatherings for multi-sector collaboration, and seeded new community-led initiatives.

Projects in year one included Community Disaster Planning to strengthen climate and emergency response for vulnerable groups, an Intimate Partner Violence research trial integrating child-centered supports, a youth dating violence study exploring technology-based prevention, youth mental health services mapping, and a primary care and immigrant services prototype co-designing clear care pathways for newcomers.

By bringing together emergency services, local government, health providers, Indigenous partners and non-profit agencies, these pilots tackled service gaps, reduced duplication, and built the foundation for a

more resilient, inclusive support system.

Early momentum has led to promising funding partnerships, including a \$40,000 commitment from the Central Okanagan Divisions of Family Practice and meaningful engagement from funders like First West Credit Union.

Shelagh Turner, who is well-known for her leadership and impact in the mental health care community, has been engaged as a lead since its inception.

"I am really optimistic. This is vital, foundational work," says Shelagh. "Thrive Okanagan is about catalyzing trust, collaboration, and building a shared vision of the future where well-being is the norm, not the exception. We are deeply grateful to KGH Foundation donors and the community for believing in the possibility of better mental health care in our community."

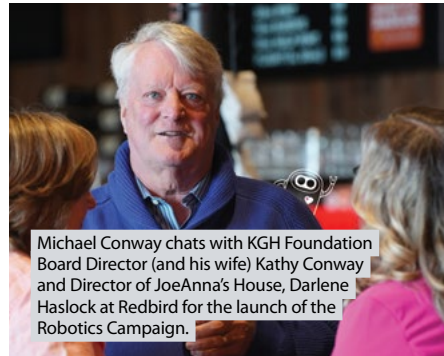

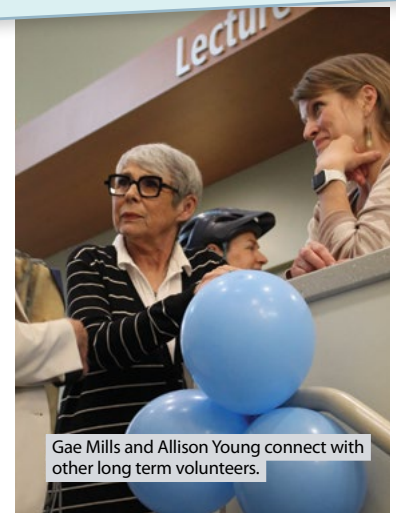
